

Dave Ainsworth, Corporate Security Advisor from Strathcona County Enforcement Services gave a riveting presentation in responding to an active shooter and how to survive should this happen in your workplace or an event you may be present at.

Karleen Schnekey from SCAN (Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods) talked about dealing with problem properties that are being used for illegal activity such as drug trafficking or gang related activity. She touched on what her unit can do about these problem properties and how they work with landowners to get rid of problem tenants or Landlords who are aware of the issues but just want to keep getting rent payments so don't wish to deal with the problem.

Lloydminster Citizens On Patrol

As provincial director, Kimberly travels across the region to deliver COP presentations, conduct group training sessions, and support the formation of new community chapters. Her efforts promote transparency, open communication, and cooperation between civilians and law enforcement.

Through organizing events and meet-and-greets, Kimberly facilitates interactions between the community and RCMP members, fostering participation in community policing initiatives. Her leadership empowers communities to address safety concerns and build stronger partnerships with law enforcement, making her a pivotal figure in crime prevention and community engagement.
